

### What happened in 2002

- **Collonade Park** - \$1.8 million in Pro Parks funding has been set aside for development of the open space under I-5. Potential improvements include pedestrian connections to Capitol Hill and an off-leash area. In 2002, the City worked with the Eastlake Stewardship Committee on proposed alternatives for park development.
- **Fairview Ave. streetscape improvements** - Portions of Fairview Avenue were designated as green streets (country lane) in the neighborhood plan. A landscaped path along Fairview was installed in front of National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Building. The Eastlake Stewardship Committee has allocated \$20,000 of its City-provided Early Implementation Fund money to extend the pathway south of NOAA. The committee is working with neighboring businesses to complete the design and raise additional funding for pathway improvements.
- **Lynn Street Park** - A community celebration was held to dedicate the new bench and tiles at this street-end park on Lake Union. The improvements were funded by a \$10,000 Neighborhood Matching Fund grant and a \$13,000 community match.

## What's Upcoming In 2003

- **Collonade Park** - The Department of Parks and Recreation is working with the community to use Pro Parks funds to develop open space under I-5 in Eastlake. Steps in 2003 include executing a lease with the Washington Department of Transportation, completing design, and ensuring public involvement. - **Fairview Avenue Pedestrian Improvements** - The Department of Neighborhoods is working with the Stewardship group and Seattle Department of Transportation to Construct pedestrian safety and trail improvements along Fairview Avenue.
