NOTES from the last meeting
June 29, 1972

Dick Carlson from the Engineering Department was a guest at the meeting to discuss questions and problems brought up at the meeting before with Bob Koch and Lynn Lindsey from the Department of Community Development.

Cars speeding along Fairview, and down Lynn street, were of major concern, and are being looked into by Leo Overton at the Engineering Dept. Various solutions were discussed, but will need further working out. We stressed that we would be willing to work with them to find solutions.

Dave Kelly will check into specific complaints businesses have with regard to the "No Parking 4-6" on the east side of Eastlake, toward the possibility of having them removed.

We have learned of a plan in connection with I-90 that would mean a segment of this new bridge (if and when it is built) would feed traffic (bus and carpool, we are told) onto Eastlake East at Louisa Street. To this it was proposed that the State Highway Department and the Engineering Department receive communication from Eastlake Council to the effect that when changes are to be made in the neighborhood, the Council be notified well in advance so that people who live in the neighborhood can be made aware of the change, ideally so that they can be included in planning changes.

Bob Koch and Lynn Lindsey from Community Development attended the meeting also.

We will not have a general meeting in August, but will get back with it in September. At the next meeting we hope to have a speaker from the League of Women Voters talk about property tax. This affects all of us, whether we rent or own. Is tax reform an answer? If so, what shape should it take?

At our general meetings we are making decisions that affect our neighborhood. Your presence will make sure that your feelings are being expressed and desires being made known. WE'RE in business for fun AND business.

The award speaks to how well people have been working together, and how hard they've been working. It's an award to anyone and everyone who has contributed their time, energy, what-have-you toward our goals.

It speaks to the interest others have, as well as ourselves, in protecting shorelines, and to the interest other councils have in preserving a neighborhood's right to help determine what happens to them.

The award is a revolving one, to be awarded to the community council who next year contributes the most to the city.

The Federation is a collection of 18 community councils and many individuals, working toward making Seattle a better place for people.
