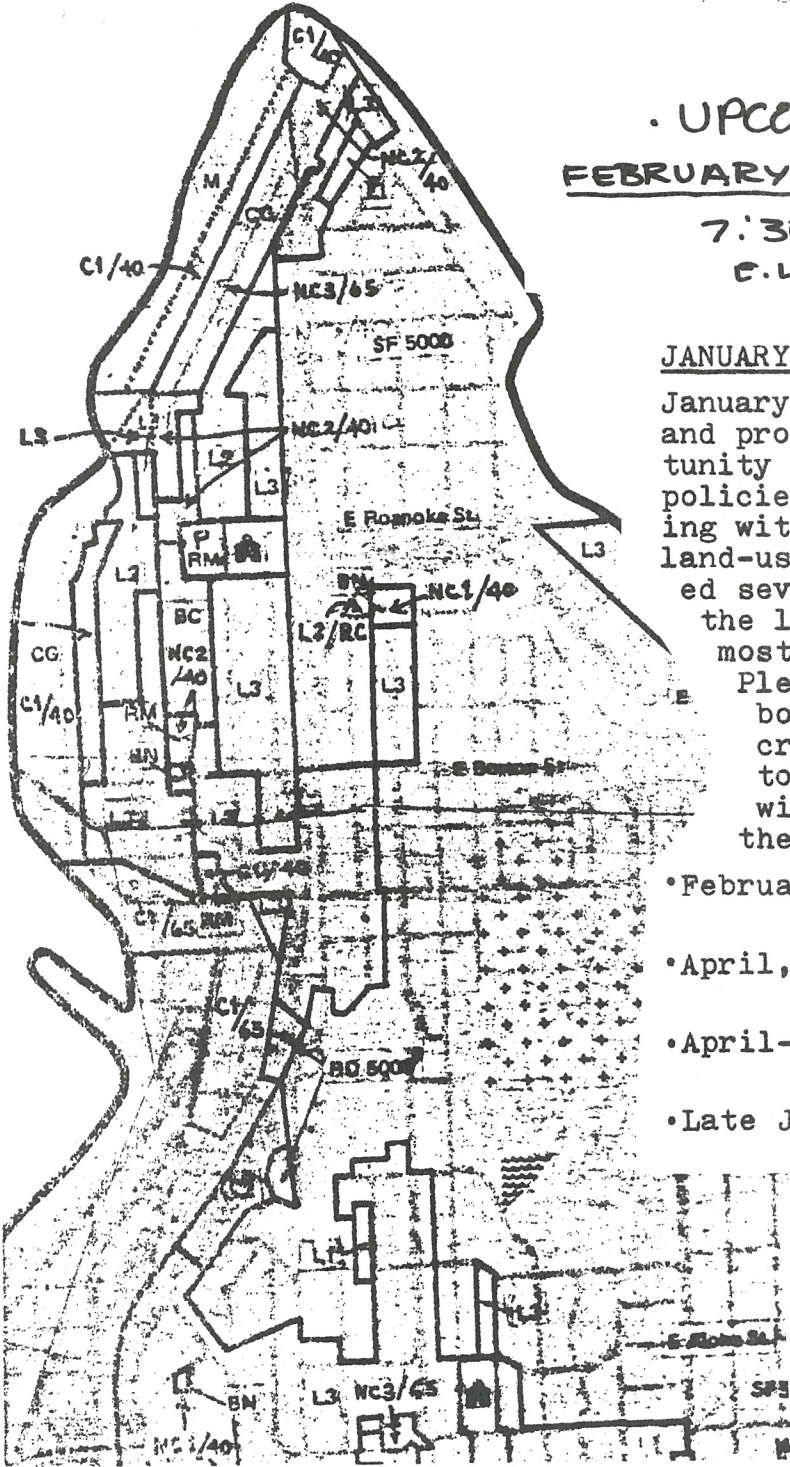

#### JANUARY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS:

January's meeting provided Eastlake residents and property owners with an excellent opportunity to review all the new zoning codes and policies for the Eastlake area. Those attending witnessed the ever-changing nature of the land-use procedural process, which has included several changes to the map published in the last newsletter, so we've provided the most recent version here for your review. Please study it carefully. The neighborhood commercial zoning issue is a critical one for Eastlake, so please try to be aware of the new developments that will constantly be occurring. Here's the timetable of upcoming events.

- February, 1983 L.U.T.P. presents their final proposal to the Mayor.
- April, 1983 Mayor's recommendations forwarded to City Council.
- April-July, '83 Land Use Committee of City Council review.
- Late July, 1983 Adoption of landuse policies and code.

**LOOKING BACK...**The Denny family name appears throughout the history and growth of the City of Seattle and her satellite neighborhoods. As early as the 1860's, the Dennys had settled in what was then the fairly remote area now called Cascade. David Denny established a lumber mill on the south shore of Lake Union in 1886 providing a closer market for logs brought through the cut between lakes Washington and Union.

Cascade and her sister community to the north, Eastlake, both developed as early residential communities, small farms and homesteads. Cascade was the jumping off place for Fremont and points north. L.H. Griggin, and company, developer of Fremont, ran the small commuter boat, the Maude Foster, from the terminus of the Lake Union Carline near Denny's Western Mill to his new city. Eastlake, in turn, was on the route to the newly established University of Washington and, in 1909, the Alaska Yukon Pacific Exposition.
