"Taking Care of Eastlake"

She has been active in the Central Seattle Community Council Federation of which we are members and worked the National Association with of Neighborhoods trying to get support for community projects. Neighborhood Commercial Areas Policies

On September 4, the City Council voted to adopt the Neighborhood Commercial Areas Policies over the opposition of community groups across the city, including ours. Mrs. Virginia Galle was the sole vote on the Council against it. Many of you got our emergency memo on this, and we would like to thank you for turning out at the meeting (at 2 p.m. the day after Labor Day, the council hearing room was full) and calling the City Council. Even though they adopted the policies, they did promise to do a careful job of implementing them. We intend to hold them to that promise, particularly in Eastlake. This is critical to the future of our neighborhood and we will need your help with it now more than ever. We will have a report on what these policies are and what they mean at the meeting.

PCB LEAK

City recently announced The the startling news that they had accidentally spilled PCBs in Lake Union and burned them, sprinkling potentially dangerous difuerons around the south end of Eastlake neighborhood. The source was contaminated oil in the old City Light plant. A technical committee is studying the problem, and we are inviting them to the meeting to answer questions. Denny Vidmar has volunteered to serve on the technical committee for ECC. Denny lives here and also is an air pollution specialist. We are concerned that the City doesn't appear to be taking steps to measure the extent of the problem it has created, and we feel they should take these steps.
